Conference themes

"The world is closed" - has been the leitmotif of the COVID-19 pandemic. The world we were familiar with has become a more unexpected and unpredictable place, entering a temporally undefined lock-down, limiting its inherent outreach and becoming more localised and regionalised. The world faces today significant global challenges such as power shifts in the international system, climate change, terrorism, healthcare, justice, war, food and human security to mention but a few. Understanding these challenges, especially during rapid instances of transformation and turbulence requires both epistemic and ontological rethinking. For the scholarship interested into the research and teaching of 21stcentury global challenges, a better understanding of the world depends also recognising epistemic unbalances and injustices put forward by hegemonic systems of knowledge production. Expanding the scope and instruments of analysis in the way we teach and research the international is impelled by changes in the real world. In the context of uncertainty and crisis of the liberal international order, emerging powers contest the centrality of existing configurations of powers, norms, and institutions. At the same time, systems of belief and knowledge production anchored to pre-existing systems of world hegemony are increasingly questioned. Yet, how do we research and teach the 'international' and global challenges? How does an interdisciplinary outlook by contributors from around the globe enable our understanding of these challenges? How are changes, continuities and paradoxes defining "the international" studied, imagined, constructed, and mutually produced? To study global dynamics, we inherently need to place the study of global challenges in context and perspective, as unequal access to power, educational opportunities and funding transform how knowledge is constituted in the first place.

The conference aims to collect both theoretical and empirical studies that contribute to developing a better understanding of contemporary global challenges and the study of the 'international'.
